Introduction Why a Consolidated Fee Hearing

- Fees hearing noticed on March 10 and March 15
- Fee hearing takes place in spring so that adjustments can be included in revenue projections for the new year
- Fee hearings consolidated for transparency

Introduction Why a Consolidated Fee Hearing

- Revenue Management Board Policy was ratified on 6/18/2021
 - "...fees and charges should cover all costs of the services provided, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Supervisors, to provide for the public benefit."

Introduction Why fees are changing

- Proposed changes reflect:
 - Increases in cost of doing business
 - Changes to service delivery
 - Updated cost studies
 - Statutory increases

Overview of Fee Changes Cost of doing business

Two main factors:

- Salary and Benefits
 - Average S&B expected to rise by 1% to 2.5% in FY 2021-22, depending on department
- Goods and Services
 - Consumer Price Index for San Francisco Bay Area – 4.2% (and rising)
- Average total around 3%

Overall 158 Fee items are changing

- 128 increasing
- 12 decreasing
- 1 eliminated
- 17 new fees
- All changes effective 7/1/2022



Auditor-Controller-Treasurer Tax Collector Total change: \$0

- Implement new fees related to collection of local debt in coordination with the state:
 - \$25 and \$3 fees to allow for collection of debt through withholdings of state income tax refund
 - \$1 fee for DMV Vessel Registration Hold Fee

Jail Booking Fees/Jail Access Fees (CAO) Total change: \$672

- Jail Booking Fees charged to arresting agencies for booking of inmates only if the state does not allocate funding
 - Not expected to be charged in FY 2022-23
- Jail Access Fee charged to arresting agencies for certain misdemeanor arrests in excess of average

Clerk-Recorder-Assessor's Office Total change: \$216,844

- Most revenue expected from new Recorder Covenant Fee allowed for implementation of AB 1466
- Adjust Assessors fees in line with a comprehensive fee study. Wide range of changes, with largest percentage increases in small dollar fees
- Implement new fees related to information requests

Public Health Lab

Total change: \$56,249

- Public Health Lab primarily funded with other sources
- Fees make up about 10% of total Health Lab budget;
- Receives \$1.2 million from Realignment funding that Board directs toward this service
- Increase of 2% to help maintain level
- Primary revenue increase based on expected increase in volume of certain fees

Regional Parks Total change: \$16,059

- Increase campsite electrical hookup fee from \$10 to \$12 to offset increasing costs, including utilities
- Increase Residence Maintenance fee by 3% to offset cost increases

Regional Parks/Sonoma Water (Spring Lake) Total change: \$151

- Increase campsite electrical hookup fee from \$10 to \$12 to offset increasing costs, including utilities
- Increase Residence Maintenance fee by 3% to offset cost increases

Sheriff's Office Total change: \$29,048

- Adjustments to a variety of fees based on changes to cost and new time studies
- Expected revenue increases primarily around security services and body removal fees

Transportation and Public Works - Airport Total change: \$3,100

- New parking convenience fees for online bookings and fees for street parking on Airport site
- 4% to 6% Increase to ground leases
- Increase to commercial vehicle operator permits of 20% to 33%

Fee Study Overview

- Comprehensive fee study for Animal Care and Control, Agriculture/Weights and Measures, and Permit Sonoma
- Launched in 2019
- Delayed due to COVID

Fee Study Overview

 Fee study designed to determine the full cost of providing services

Study is not designed to look at efficiencies

Study does include comparison to other agencies

Agriculture/Weights and Measures Fee Study Findings

- Total Cost recovery of 51% in study
- Remainder subsidized by General Fund and some state/grant funds
- Subsidy varies across divisions
 - Highest in Land Stewardship Division (VESCO, Frost Ordinance)
 - Lowest in Weights and Measures

Agriculture/Weights and Measures Total change: \$107,102

- Recommendation:
 - Increase General Fund by \$145,000 to mitigate increases
 - Agriculture Division adjusted from 57% to 62% cost recovery
 - Land Stewardship Fees adjusted from 50% to 57% cost recovery
 - Current VESCO subsidy over \$300,000
 - Weights and measures fees adjusted from 83% to 92% cost recovery

Animal Care and Control Fee Study Findings

- Division at cost recovery as a whole
- Many fees not comprehensively reviewed in 15 to 20 years
- Some fees now recover above cost due to efficiencies, others well below cost recovery
- Division receives support from General Fund (\$1.4 million) and contract revenues

Animal Care and Control Total change: \$99,686

- Increase General Fund support by \$234,000 to allow for subsidy of fees that promote good outcomes such as adoption of older pets and prevent significant increases
- Reduce all fees that are now above cost recovery to level of cost recovery
- Increase other fees by an average of 13%, in line with cost-of-doing business increases from FY 2019-20 to 2022-23

Permit Sonoma Fee Study Findings

- Total Cost recovery of 79%
- Fees supported by significant \$3.6 million in General Fund Support, have received additional support in recent years
- Fees are being significantly restructured to better align with services, including deletion and replacement of many categories

Permit Sonoma Total Changes: \$705,849

- Provide additional \$1 million in General Fund support to limit increase of fees
- Restructure fee schedule to better align with services provided
- Increase fees by an average of 9% to account for increased costs of doing business between 2019-20 and 2022-23

FY 2022-23 Fee Hearings Recommended Actions

- Approve additional ongoing General Fund support for departments as follows:
 - \$145,000 for Agriculture/Weights and Measures
 - \$234,000 for Animal Care and Control
 - \$1 million for Permit Sonoma
- Approve fee adjustments as described in individual board items
