PHA Goal 1: Increase Housing Choices for Assisted Tenants

The Housing Authority has continued its successful outreach and engagement efforts with property owners and managers, resulting in the addition of 98 new owners over the past 12 months.

Housing options for rent-assisted tenants have also become easier to identify through the Housing Authority's online housing search tool. During the previous 12 months, 419 new units were added to the database, increasing the total number of units to 2,053. These units can be readily activated by any of the 401 enrolled property owners as they become available. The platform further supports system coordination by connecting 192 registered supportive services case managers who are actively assisting rent-assisted households in locating housing.

An additional strategy for increasing housing choice is the Housing Authority's Homeownership Program. During Calendar Year 2025, 39 homeownership interest forms were submitted by rent-assisted households. Of those, 23 households completed the required pre-qualification steps to assess eligibility for homeownership. Two households successfully completed home purchases, bringing the total number of assisted homeownership households to four. An additional three households have had purchase offers accepted and are currently completing the final steps toward homeownership.

PHA Goal 2: Expand the Supply of Assisted Housing

The Housing Authority continues to pursue additional rental assistance vouchers whenever opportunities arise. During Calendar Year 2025, the Housing Authority received 18 Foster Youth Initiative vouchers and 10 Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) vouchers. The Housing Authority also applied for an additional allocation of VASH vouchers and anticipates receiving five new vouchers in Spring 2026.

Project-Based Vouchers (PBVs) remain a key tool for expanding the supply of assisted housing. By applying PBVs to housing developments, the Housing Authority increases the availability of affordable units for low-income households and individuals and families experiencing homelessness. In Calendar Year 2025, 41 new PBV units were placed into service. Over the upcoming five-year period, an additional 199 newly constructed PBV units are anticipated to come online, including:

- 21 units at George's Hideaway, Guerneville (anticipated Spring 2026)
- 8 units at Heritage Park, Windsor (anticipated late Summer 2026)

- 18 units at Summer Oaks, Sonoma (anticipated mid-2027)
- 33 units at Meridian at Corona, Petaluma (anticipated late 2027)
- 70 units at Copeland Creek Apartments, Rohnert Park (anticipated early 2027)
- 5 units at Redwood Glen Apartments, Windsor (anticipated late 2027)
- 14 units at Dry Creek Commons, Healdsburg (anticipated late 2027)
- 30 units at Caritas Homes Phase 2, Santa Rosa (anticipated early 2028)

The Housing Authority also works to expand housing supply by attracting new landlords to participate in rental assistance programs. During Calendar Year 2025, 98 new owners and property managers began working with the Housing Authority.

Additionally, the Housing Authority administered a grant-funded security deposit assistance program that provided financial support to 180 low-income households. This program reduced barriers to housing access by helping households overcome upfront move-in costs, accelerated lease-up timelines, supported housing stability, and strengthened partnerships with property owners through increased successful placements of rent-assisted households.

The Housing Navigation Program continued to demonstrate strong performance in assisting some of the community's most vulnerable residents. During Calendar Year 2025, the program assisted 21 households (47 individuals) experiencing homelessness in achieving permanent housing.

Due to limited voucher issuance during the year, the Housing Navigation Program strategically shifted its focus to providing intensive housing navigation services to households residing at homeless-dedicated PBV sites. This approach supported households in transitioning from supportive housing when intensive services were no longer needed, ensuring that limited supportive housing resources remain available for households with the highest service needs while promoting long-term housing stability and independence.

In addition, the Housing Navigation Program offered 18 housing navigation workshops to equip housing seekers and supportive service staff with the tools, knowledge, and resources needed to successfully secure housing. These workshops strengthened system-wide capacity, improved housing readiness, and enhanced collaboration among service providers and property owners.

PHA Goal 3: Promote Self-Sufficiency Among Assisted Tenants

To promote self-sufficiency, the Housing Authority operates a Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) program. The FSS program is voluntary and is designed to help rent-assisted households achieve financial independence through goal setting, individualized support, job training, and savings accumulation through an escrow account that is paid to participants upon successful completion of their five-year plan.

Currently, 51 households are actively participating in the FSS program. Three participants are in the final stages of achieving homeownership. An additional 323 families remain on the FSS waitlist, and six households have successfully graduated from the program since July 1, 2025.

To staff the FSS program, the Housing Authority applies annually for HUD grant funding to support one full-time position. The Housing Authority has once again received full funding for Calendar Year 2026.

PHA Goal 4: Expand Rental Assistance to House the Unhoused in Sonoma County

The Housing Authority continues its strong partnerships with supportive service agencies through Continuum of Care-funded grants, specialized voucher programs, and homeless preferences. These partnerships serve some of the hardest-to-house populations, including individuals with disabilities, homeless families, seniors, survivors of domestic violence, former foster youth, and families working toward reunification. On average, the Housing Authority assists approximately 3,300 households each month through its rental assistance programs.

During Calendar Year 2025, 41 project-based permanent supportive housing (PSH) units were placed into service, including 29 units at Elderberry Commons in Sebastopol and 11 units at Petaluma River Place in Petaluma. An additional 70 PSH units are currently under construction throughout Sonoma County, with developments underway at George's Hideaway (Guerneville), Dry Creek Commons (Healdsburg), Meridian at Corona (Petaluma), Heritage Park (Windsor), and Summer Oaks (Sonoma). Another 105 PSH units are in the pre-construction phase.

In addition to project-based programs, the Housing Authority continues to provide tenant-based rental assistance to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. During Calendar Year 2025, rental assistance was provided to 135 households (214 individuals) who were homeless at admission. The Housing Authority is also actively working to identify

an ongoing funding source to transition Emergency Housing Voucher households prior to the program's scheduled end on December 31, 2026.

PHA Goal 5: Maintain a High Performer SEMAP Score

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, the Housing Authority received a 100 percent score under the Section Eight Management Assessment Program (SEMAP) and was designated a "High Performer" for the 19th consecutive year.

Consolidated Plans covering the jurisdiction of the PHA. These needs are identified by income, family type and specific housing problems. 1. The Sonoma County 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan includes goals of increasing and preserving affordable housing and promoting strategies for homelessness prevention and intervention in the County are high priorities. Specific goals related to these priorities are to support the construction of rental units and to increase tenant based rental assistance. Activities included within the PHA Five Year Plan are consistent with the priorities contained in the Sonoma County Consolidated Plan, which include providing decent, affordable housing for low-income persons, and coordinated efforts to assist those experiencing homelessness to gain housing. 2. The 2025 – 2029 Consolidated Plan for the City of Petaluma includes goals specific to increasing the supply of affordable rental housing for Petaluma’s lowest income households, preserving existing affordable housing stock and providing equitable housing to special needs populations. Activities included in the PHA Five Year Plan are consistent with the initiatives contained in the City of Petaluma Consolidated Plan which include providing decent, affordable housing for low-income persons. The most recent Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing study (AI) found that the displacement of residents due to economic pressures and the lack of affordable, accessible housing in a range of sizes were key barriers faced by persons of protected classes within the jurisdiction of the PHA. Activities and specific goals included in the PHA Five Year Plan which are consistent with the Consolidated Plan and Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing include: a. Increasing housing choice for assisted tenants b. Expanding the supply of assisted housing c. Expanding rental assistance opportunities for the unhoused in Sonoma County

Acting on behalf of the Board of Commissioners of the Public Housing Agency (PHA) listed below, as its Chairperson or other authorized PHA official if there is no Board of Commissioners, I approve the submission of the 5-Year and/or X Annual PHA Plan, hereinafter referred to as "the Plan," of which this document is a part, and make the following certification and agreements with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the PHA fiscal year beginning 07/2026, in which the PHA receives assistance under 42 U.S.C. 1437f and/or 1437g in connection with the submission of the Plan and implementation thereof:

1. The Plan is consistent with the applicable comprehensive housing affordability strategy (or any plan incorporating such strategy) for the jurisdiction in which the PHA is located (24 CFR § 91.2).
2. The Plan contains a signed certification by the appropriate State or local official (form HUD-50077-SL) that the Plan is consistent with the applicable Consolidated Plan, which includes any applicable fair housing goals or strategies, for the PHA's jurisdiction and a description of the way the PHA Plan is consistent with the applicable Consolidated Plan (24 CFR §§ 91.2, 91.225, 91.325, and 91.425).
3. The PHA has established a Resident Advisory Board or Boards, the membership of which represents the residents assisted by the PHA, consulted with this Resident Advisory Board or Boards in developing the Plan, including any changes or revisions to the policies and programs identified in the Plan before they were implemented, and considered the recommendations of the Resident Advisory Board (24 CFR 903.13). The PHA has included in the Plan submission a copy of the recommendations made by the Resident Advisory Board or Boards and a description of the way the Plan addresses these recommendations.
4. The PHA provides assurance as part of this certification that:
 - i. The Resident Advisory Board had an opportunity to review and comment on the changes to the policies and programs before implementation by the PHA;
 - ii. The changes were duly approved by the PHA Board of Directors (or similar governing body); and
 - iii. The revised policies and programs are available for review and inspection, at the principal office of the PHA during normal business hours. Where possible, PHAs should make documents available electronically, for public inspection upon request.
5. The PHA made the proposed Plan and all information relevant to the public hearing available for public inspection at least 45 days before the hearing, published a notice that a hearing would be held and conducted a hearing to discuss the Plan and invited public comment. The PHA ensured all notices and meetings provided effective communication with persons with disabilities and further provided meaningful language access for persons with Limited English Proficiency (LEP).
6. The PHA certifies that it will carry out the public housing program of the agency in conformity with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d-2000d-4), the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601-19), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794), Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.), the Violence Against Women Act (34 U.S.C. § 12291 et seq.), and other applicable civil rights requirements, and that it will affirmatively further fair housing in the administration of all HUD programs. In addition, if it administers a Housing Choice Voucher Program, the PHA certifies that it will administer the program in conformity with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Fair Housing Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Violence Against Women Act, and other applicable civil rights requirements, and that it will affirmatively further fair housing in the administration of all HUD programs.
7. The PHA will affirmatively further fair housing, in compliance with the Fair Housing Act, 24 CFR § 5.150 et seq., 24 CFR § 903.7(o), and 24 CFR § 903.15, which means that it will take meaningful actions, in addition to combating discrimination, that overcome patterns of segregation and foster inclusive communities free from barriers that restrict access to opportunity based on protected characteristics. Specifically, affirmatively furthering fair housing means taking meaningful actions that, taken together, address significant disparities in housing needs and in access to opportunity, replacing segregated living patterns with truly integrated and balanced living

patterns, transforming racially or ethnically concentrated areas of poverty into areas of opportunity, and fostering and maintaining compliance with civil rights and fair housing laws (24 CFR § 5.151). Pursuant to 24 CFR § 903.15(c)(2), a PHA's policies should be designed to reduce the concentration of tenants and other assisted persons by race, national origin, and disability. PHA policies should include affirmative steps stated in 24 CFR § 903.15(c)(2)(i) and 24 CFR § 903.15(c)(2)(ii). Furthermore, under 24 CFR § 903.7(o), a PHA must submit a civil rights certification with its Annual and 5-year PHA Plans, except for qualified PHAs who submit the Form HUD-50077-CR as a standalone document. The PHA certifies that it will take no action that is materially inconsistent with its obligation to affirmatively further fair housing.

 - Adoption of a site-based waiting list would not violate any court order or settlement agreement or be inconsistent with a pending complaint brought by HUD;
 - The PHA shall take reasonable measures to assure that such a waiting list is consistent with affirmatively furthering fair housing; and
 - The PHA provides for review of its site-based waiting list policy to determine if it is consistent with civil rights laws and certifications, as specified in 24 CFR 903.7(o)(1).
9. The PHA will comply with the prohibitions against discrimination based on age pursuant to the Age Discrimination Act of 1975.
10. In accordance with the Fair Housing Act, the PHA will not base a determination of eligibility for housing on marital status and will not otherwise discriminate because of sex.
11. The PHA will comply with the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 and 24 CFR Part 41, 'Policies and Procedures for the Enforcement of Standards and Requirements for Accessibility by the Physically Handicapped' for people with physical disabilities.
12. The PHA will comply with the requirements of Section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, Employment Opportunities for Low-or Very-Low Income Persons, and with its implementing regulation at 24 CFR Part 135.
13. The PHA will comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 and implement the regulations at 49 CFR Part 24 as applicable.
14. The PHA will take appropriate affirmative action to award contracts to minority and women's business enterprises under 24 CFR 5.105(a).
15. The PHA will provide the responsible entity or HUD any documentation that the responsible entity or HUD needs to carry out its review under the National Environmental Policy Act and other related authorities in accordance with 24 CFR Part 58 or Part 50, respectively.
16. With respect to public housing the PHA will comply with Davis-Bacon or HUD determined wage rate requirements under Section 12 of the United States Housing Act of 1937 and the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.
17. The PHA will keep records in accordance with 2 CFR 200.302 and facilitate an effective audit to determine compliance with program requirements.
18. The PHA will comply with the Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act, the Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992, and 24 CFR Part 35.
19. The PHA will comply with the policies, guidelines, and requirements of 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Financial Assistance, including but not limited to submitting the assurances required under 24 CFR §§ 1.5, 3.115, 8.50, and 107.25 by submitting an SF-424, including the required assurances in SF-424B or D, as applicable.
20. The PHA will undertake only activities and programs covered by the Plan in a manner consistent with its Plan and will utilize covered grant funds only for activities that are approvable under the regulations and included in its Plan.
