The Sonoma County District Attorney's Office allocation to continue the Victim Witness Assistance Program is \$827,222. Descriptions and calculations for each budget category and line item are included below.

All funding will go to salaries and benefits for the advocate staff to provide mandatory and optional services to victims. All other mandatory services will be funded through the County's General Fund.

As a designated Mass Victimization Advocate (MVA), the Senior Victim Advocate will devote 50% of her time for the first three months at a cost of \$12,756. The project budget supports one half-time Senior Advocate for three months increasing to full-time for the remaining nine months and four full-time Advocates with an additional advocate at slightly less than half-time. All advocates provide outreach and link crime victims to services. Services are provided to all victims regardless of case filing. Funding from the proposed budget will ensure that victims receive the most up to date information about the case status and services available to them as well as allowing us to continue to be victim centered.



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 How funds are allocated to minimize administrative costs and support direct services.

Allocations requested will be used to fund direct services as the priority for the proposed program. The grant award will be dedicated to employee salaries and benefits without operating expenses for training and supplies. No indirect costs are requested. The Advocates have varied education and experience in building trusting relations and a strong working knowledge of resources available in Sonoma County. Our most tenured advocate has been with the DA's Office for over 19 years and was promoted to Senior Advocate in December 2020. Our newest advocate, hired in May 2022, brings 17 years of advocacy experience from a rape crisis center. All are passionate about their roles and are eager to learn and implement best trauma-informed care practices.

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PROBLEM STATEMENT

<u>PLAN</u>

The Sonoma County District Attorney's Office, Victim Services Division will continue to provide culturally appropriate, trauma informed services, and support all victims of crime in the aftermath of the pandemic. The team consists of the Director, a Senior Advocate, eleven advocates, two restitution specialists, an administrative aide (Homeless Outreach Coordinator), and a legal processor. Most staff are housed at the Hall of Justice in Santa Rosa to allow for easy access by the public and victims that may be testifying or wishing to be heard by the Court. Santa Rosa is located in Sonoma County an urban-rural county in which the population consists of various ethnic groups. As a result of various funding sources, the Sonoma County Victim Services Division is made up of 17 staff. In the last fiscal year, the Division served over 2,485 individuals, including 1,220 victims of domestic violence, and provided 211 unsheltered victims of crime a safe place to stay. Currently, we have three advocates assigned to a domestic violence caseload, the Senior Victim Advocate is assigned to the foster youth caseload as well as assisting in coordinating mass casualty plan preparation. We have two specialized caseloads: elder abuse/dependent adult

and Violence Against Women (VV) crimes. The elder advocate assists dependent adults and elder abuse victims; the VV advocate assists survivors of sexual assault and other violent crimes. These victims are served by vertical assignment teams, composed of a victim advocate, investigator, and attorney. Both these specialized advocates are stationed at Family Justice Center Sonoma County to ensure victims get full wrap around services. All advocates work to build rapport, increase cooperation with prosecution, and promote California Victim Compensation claims. Our entire team works to ensure that victims of crime are provided with the information about resources available, which many times include one of the collocated partner agencies the local Family Justice Center Sonoma County.

The Family Justice Center of Sonoma County (FJCSC) is a site for referrals for victims of domestic violence, elder abuse, and sexual assault. The FJCSC works with partner agencies to provide a referral or an appointment to various partner agencies services; it serves as another local safe site for a victim of such crimes to be connected to an advocate. Primary FJCSC community partners include the YWCA (serving domestic violence victims), Verity (serving sexual assault victims), Legal Aid (aiding with civil restraining orders), Council on Aging (serving elder victims), and Catholic Charities (assisting victims in U-Visa and



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VAWA applications). Government partners include law enforcement, Santa Rosa Police Department and the Sonoma County Sheriff's Domestic Violence Sexual Assault units, Human Services -Redwood Children's Center, Family, Youth and Children Services, Adult Protective Services, and Health Services providing mental health services. Stationed at FJCSC, District Attorney staff include attorneys and investigators who focus on child abuse, elder abuse, and the VV cases, who are housed at FJCSC providing a collaborative working approach to serving victims in one place.

The County's Human Services Departments' Redwood Children Services (RCC) conducts forensic interviews of minors who have disclosed a type of victimization. Intakes are completed and later sent to Victim Services for a victim advocate assignment. This partnership between Victim Services and RCC provides the opportunity for California Victim Compensation Board (VCB) claims to be completed in these cases, which might otherwise never be formally referred for charging consideration and may have never benefited from Victim Services. Another service co-located at FJC is the Homeless Outreach Team. Team members from the XC grant, serving homeless victims of crime, including the program coordinator, are housed at the FJCSC, and receive direct referrals from DA advocates and partners. The Homeless Outreach team (HOT) is part of



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the vulnerable population grant award. The HOT team has become essential when working with victims of crime to ensure they are provided with additional support after an incident and allowing some respite.

Over half the Victim Services staff are bilingual/bicultural Spanish advocates, a goal in the upcoming years will be to improve the division's ability to provide culturally-aware services to address the trend of additional immigrant clients. Victim Services brochures include a Marsy's Law insert, are available in English and Spanish, and on our website. A goal for the upcoming year is to update the brochures and potentially offer office literature in various media forms and additional languages.

As a result of COVID-19 volunteers were unable to participate in the program during the last grant cycle. A goal for the upcoming year is to recruit volunteers and develop an intern program for our division. There are two colleges in the jurisdiction, Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) and Sonoma State University. SRJC offers a Human Services/Advocacy certificate/associate degree program. A continued goal is to further develop relationships with the colleges to promote volunteer and/or internship possibilities. Currently we collaborate with these colleges for outreach and educational events. Upon selection,



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volunteers and interns must pass a background check, receive training, and would be partnered with advocates to obtain a wide variety of experience.

The Victim Services Division collaborates with other county departments, law enforcement, and community agencies. Operational agreements are currently in effect until December 31, 2025. We have added multiple new partners last year and a goal will be to continue to build new partnerships. Victim Services has excellent working relationships with local partner agencies, providing training and connecting at various outreach events. The Victim Services Director and staff are part of many multi-disciplinary teams including the Family Violence Prevention Council, Human Trafficking Task Force, Redwood Children Center Multidisciplinary Team, Elder Abuse Multidisciplinary Team, Elder Protection Workgroup, and the Domestic Violence Death Review.

We have continued to build collaborative relationships with various local immigrant groups and agencies that serve various populations. In efforts to reach more individuals in our community, we continue to have a close bond with our local non-profit radio station and hope to complete quarterly interviews on KBBF, a Spanish-speaking radio station, highlighting Human Trafficking month (January), Child Abuse, Sexual Assault month, and Victims' Rights Week (April), Elder Abuse Awareness (June), Domestic Violence Awareness month (October)



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and Homeless Awareness month (November). A goal for the upcoming year is to have an advocate regularly reconnecting and attending monthly Latino Service Providers meetings, which features various local agencies that serve the local Hispanic community; along with possibly hosting one of meetings in honor of National Crime Victims' Rights Week. Over the last year additional outreach to underserved populations included VetConnect, La Luz, Verity's volunteer training, and our second National Crime Victims' Rights Week Community and Resource Fair. y. To bring more awareness to our services, we will continue attending in person outreach events, such as the Senior Expo Fair, Take Back the Night, and the Fiesta de Independencia at Luther Burbank Center of the Arts.

Through the last couple years and with support of this grant, the Division has been able to purchase various promotional items including pens, bags, stress balls, and crayons. Promotional items allow for the Division to interact with various community members while completing outreach efforts.

Another way grant funds have been able to support the development of the Division, is utilizing funds for staff trainings which are attended by Victim Services advocates to stay informed with latest and best practice while they work with victims of crime. Some of the trainings include: CCVAA Entry Level Advocate Academy, Crisis Response Training, NOVA Conference, Leave No Victim Behind.



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In the upcoming grant cycle, we hope to be able to send advocates to the Advanced Advocate Training, if offered by Waymakers, and to any additional crisis training offered.

Ongoing objectives and activities in the advocate unit include:

- Provide excellent and comprehensive mandatory and optional services to victims of violent crime, including filing VCB applications and assisting in collection of restitution.
- Continue to contact all crime victims to provide information on advocacy, resources, and updates on the criminal justice system to support victims, witnesses, and their families.
- Respond to victims requesting services by letter and phone to offer services and inform them of their Marsy's Law rights.
- Continue to expand relationships with collaborate partners to better serve victims of family violence, child abuse, sexual assault, elder abuse, and other general crimes.
- Continue to provide community outreach and educational presentations focused on reaching underserved populations in the county.
- Maintain and/or increase the number of bilingual and bicultural Spanishspeaking staff.



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- Enter all victims and services provided in the Prosecutor by Karpel case management system and maintain updated contact information for all victims of active cases.
- Provide training regarding our programs and services to law enforcement,
 community-based organizations, and colleges in our county.
- Staff informational booths at community events with victim rights information, brochures, and an outline of services available.
- Continue to refine the use of court support dogs, Miranda and Darla, the
 office comfort dogs, obtained through Paws as Loving Support, a local
 nonprofit agency.
- Continue efforts to recruit volunteers and interns.
- Enhance emergency assistance by offering a variety of resources such as food, clothing, and transportation vouchers.

MVA PLAN

The Mass Victimization Advocates (MVA) work with other advocates to kick start our goal of implanting a countywide Mass Casualty Plan. One of the MVA advocates was able to attend the required Crisis Response Training offered by CCVAA and the virtual Leave No Victim Behind Conference. During this past grant cycle, two of the 11 advocates attended the Virtual NOVA Crisis



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Response. Our continued goal is to improve the team's collaboration with other agencies and to further define each role while learning from other agencies who have had experience responding to mass-casualty incidents. During the upcoming performance period, we hope to be able to send two more advocates to the CCVAA Crisis Response Training and have two more advocates complete FBI and FEMA webinars.

Sonoma County is part of the Bay Area Mass Casualty Planning

Committee and has current Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) with the participating nine counties; we have renewed our partnership and signed an update MOU April 2023. We are motivated to develop the plan in more detail and engage partners in our community. During this performance period we had discussions and completed staff introductions with Santa Rosa Police

Department and hope to be able to introduce our services to more Emergency Response Partners. Some of our targeted partners will include Sonoma County Sheriff and Coroner's Office, Red Cross, City of Santa Rosa Emergency

Management, and the Sonoma County Emergency Preparedness Team. We continue to be a regular attending member of the Community Organizations

Activated in time of Disaster (COAD).



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As per our plan, the senior advocates created a planning committee. The committee has met twice a month and soon will be updating our Go-Bags for all advocate staff and our facility dogs. We have divided the advocate into four groups; group A would respond when activated by Investigators Bureau Chief, group B would relieve group A after 24-48 hours of being part of the incident response. Group C composed of our comfort dogs would potentially respond as back up to group A or B or be deployed for four to eight hours during post-event response. Group D would be the advocate that would stay at the Hall of Justice to take care of the day-to-day responsibilities of the Division. In the next year, we will continue meeting twice a month to further define Mass Casualty within our team and prepare for the roles and responsibilities each member of the team could take. In the next reporting period, we hope to take the MVA plan to the various union groups to ensure advocates roles and involvement in the event of a mass casualty will be receive adequate compensation for their time. Go-Bags include a backpack style bag, with the following supplies: Emergency blanket, face mask, first aid kit, hand sanitizer, flashlight, tissue, rain poncho, disposable gloves, notebook, clipboard, pocket file folder, charger with multi plug adapter, and water. VCB claim packets, brochures, business cards, and resources are stocked in the folder. Safety bags were updated with emergency supplies for

victims as recommended by the Bay Area Mass Casualty training. The facility dog backpack includes a collapsible bowl, leash, collar, doggie bags, and food. Additional supplies include team vests and jackets, items for children ("My heroes" coloring books and crayons), stress balls, and pens. Outreach will be conducted throughout the performance period in a variety of settings.

Goals:

- With the assistance of the DA Chief Investigator, build partnerships with law enforcement, and staff from both the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office
 - and Santa Rosa Police Department
- Create MOUs for county partnerships to include Red Cross, Salvation
 Army, Sonoma County Chaplaincy and COAD
- Become part of the county-wide emergency plan with a defined role in the Emergency Operation Center
- Build relationship with coroner's office (provider of death notifications)
- Continue to create opportunities for staff to attend trainings related to mass casualty.


