

- Adopt five (5) Resolutions overruling objections, adopting a report on charges for sewage services, modifications to rate structures and confirming charges for 1) Sonoma County Water Agency Sanitation Zones Airport-Larkfield-Wikiup, Geyserville, Penngrove, and Sea Ranch; and County Sanitation Districts 2) Occidental, 3) Russian River, 4) South Park, and 5) Sonoma Valley.
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FY 2025/2026 Proposed Rate Increases – Zones



Sanitation Rate Relief Program

Why?

• People with reduced or fixed income may struggle to pay sanitation bills

Who?

- Residential customers who own and live in their home as their primary residence
- Current participant in the PG&E CARE Program, or
- Total income of all persons living in the home of 75% or less of the area median family income
- 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations that provide housing to low-income renters

How much?

- 50% of FY 25-26 sewer bill for eligible customers
- Up to \$600,000 from Sonoma Water General Fund

How will people be informed?

 Website, social media, press release, outreach through social service agencies and non-profit organizations

State Water and Wastewater Arrearage Grants: FY 22/23: \$146,500 for 86 customers. FY 23/24: \$189,600 for 109 customers. Russian River CSD pursuing \$45 million for Headworks Lift Station Force Main Project. Sonoma Valley CSD issued \$15 Million in Revenue Bonds in July 2022 to fund capital improvements.

Proposed Capacity Charges

Key objectives of the Wastewater Capacity Charge Study:

- "Growth pays for Growth"
- Comply with legal requirements of California Government Code.



Capacity Charges

Capacity Charges Are:

- A one-time fee paid by new customers as a condition of development or changes in property use that result in increased capacity needs to help ensure that new growth does not burden existing rate payers.
- Levied to recover costs for capacity in facilities benefiting new development.
- Regulated by Government Code Section 66013
 - Capacity charges can recover costs for existing facilities or future facilities



Proposed Capacity Charges

System Buy-In Approach

- New connections "buy in" for their proportionate share of costs for capacity needed in existing wastewater system facilities and assets.
- Option A: Buy-in value based on reasonable replacement cost of system assets (in current dollars).
- Option B: Buy-in value based on replacement cost of system assets (in current dollars) reduced by depreciation (in current dollars) which reflects that age and use reduces the value of existing assets.





Proposed Capacity Charges Effective Date

Effective July 1, 2025.

Housing Developments:

- Subject to the exceptions in Government Code section 65589.5(o), capacity charges shall be calculated based on the charges that were:
 - in effect when a preliminary application is submitted to the city or county, or
 - in the case of no preliminary application, at the time the application is deemed complete by the entitling land use agency.



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
