Background

- Multi-District Prescription Opioid Litigation (MDL) goal to hold opioid pharmaceuticals financially responsible for the harms caused by the national opioid epidemic
 - Pharmaceutical distributors McKesson, Cardinal Health and
 AmerisourceBergen, and with manufacturers Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc.
 and its parent company Johnson & Johnson reached a settlement in 2022
 - Teva and Allergan reached a settlement in 2023
 - Walmart, Walgreens, and CVS reached a settlement in 2024
- Numerous litigations still pending
- Funding allocations will continue to grow

Priorities set by BOS in February

- Substance Use Treatment and Recovery Services:
 - Additional Substance Use Disorder (SUD) residential treatment beds and/or facility
 - Additional residential treatment beds for clients currently in jail needing placement
 - Adolescent Residential, Outpatient, and Office Based Opioid (OBOT) Treatment
 - Funding for Recovery Housing and aftercare services
 - Dual Diagnosis Substance Use Disorder treatment program w/Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
- Establish an Opioid Prevention and Community Crisis Grant Program for local communitybased and non-profit organizations
- Allowable support for the Sheriff's Office Opioid Prevention, Education, Research and Abatement Team
- Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure Program (BHCIP) source of match funds for SUDrelated State grant submissions
- SUDs-related large-scale projects, such as BeWell, Behavioral Health Housing Unit (BHHU), and SB 43 implementation

Priorities - Continued

- Outreach and Marketing for Prevention:
 - School workshops
 - Community education nights
 - Expansion of prevention services with new contracts emphasizing opioids
 - Media outreach and advertising materials
- Consider development of a stakeholder input group
- Consider development of a funding allocation policy to apply to future settlement distributions

Proposal Evaluation: June 12, 2025 – 3 SUD representatives from County Health Departments (Marin, Glenn, Napa) rated each proposal and met to rank and finalize recommendations using established criteria

Section II Qualifications and Experience — 90 Points
Section III Project Approach and Work Schedule — 165 Points
Section IV Privacy and Security — 20 Points
Section V Fiscal — 20 Points
Section VI Cost Of Service / Budget — 30 Points
Section VII Leveraged Funds — 30 Points
Section VIII Sustainability — 30 Points

Section IX Monitoring and Evaluation – 30 Points

* Proposals for projects within the Prioritized Areas and High Impact Abatement Activities (HIAA) will be weighted higher in proposal scoring

NOFA Funding Priorities

- Recovery Residences Additional capacity in safe, healthy, familylike substance-free living environments that support people in recovery from addiction to fill in demographic and regional gaps in the Opioid Use Disorder (OUD)/SUD service continuum.
- Syringe Exchange Programs Increasing capacity for syringe exchange programs that provide education on safe injection practices, sterile injecting supplies, wound care supplies, connections to SUD treatment, mental health services, and healthcare services including infectious disease testing.
- Prevention, Education, and Harm Reduction Media and information targeting key audiences for education and harm reduction efforts by coordinating with community partners, supporting events and engagement activities, and providing training where appropriate.
