1) Funding through this grant opportunity will provide necessary resources to expand the provision of trauma-informed direct victim services for child survivors of violence and their families at RCC. The requested funding will increase capacity by supporting a 0.5 FTE Child Protective Services Social Worker (CPSSW) to conduct forensic interviews and a dedicated 1.0 FTE bilingual Family Advocate (FA), both of whom will be co-located at RCC. A significant portion of the proposed budget is allocated toward continuing to provide traumainformed, evidence-based mental health services to victims and families through second tier subawards. Additional funding will allow for in-depth training of the MDT through conferences and outside training opportunities. Funding will be used to purchase gift cards for our clients for transportation services, groceries, gas and personal items. Funding will also be used for office supplies, marketing materials and building resiliency for support staff. Lastly, a small portion of the budget will be used to supplement the cost of a secure, cloudbased system for interview file storage, and for video streaming services in the family waiting room. The amount requested is \$200,000 and the match is \$50,000, resulting in a total project budget of \$250,000, as detailed in the budget pages.

- 2) Of the \$200,000 requested from CalOES, \$172,555 (86.3%) will be allocated to direct services provided to child victims of crime, including forensic interviews, mental health services, and family advocacy support. RCC will leverage the unique expertise of FJC partners to deliver a broad array of essential services.
- 3) The match requirements will be met with a \$50,000 in-kind match contributed toward the Forensic Interviewer (CPSSW) salary. Match funds will be provided by non-federal sources.
- 4) Grant-funded staff will focus exclusively on the provision of direct services for child victims and their families. The full-time FA will serve a pivotal role for RCC clients, providing case management, advocacy, and resource navigation. The FA will contact families prior to the forensic interview to complete a pre-intake and help the family prepare, and will follow-up post-interview to improve survey response. FA support will continue throughout the life of the case, long after the interview ends. The 0.5 FTE CPSSW will conduct forensic interviews with child victims, increasing RCC's interviewing capacity. Both positions will allow for more flexible, client-centered scheduling, enabling RCC to expand after-hours support.
- 5) In order to maximize available resources and reduce staffing costs, RCC will contract with experienced community service providers for advocacy and

a. Problem Statement

A Problem Statement is not required.

b. Plan

1) RCC is accredited by The National Children's Alliance (NCA) providing forensic interviews, medical examinations, trauma-focused evidence-supported mental health services, family advocacy, and follow-up services to child victims and witnesses of crime and their non-offending caregivers in a safe, trauma-informed, child friendly location.

All new MDT members engage in orientation training and their required training and credentials include the following: MDT Coordinator is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW) trained in MDT facilitation, leadership, child abuse, and forensic interviewing with a minimum of 8 hours continuing education every two years. Forensic Interviewers complete an initial 32-hour NCA recognized Child Forensic Interview Training (CFIT) course, receive 8 hours of continuing education every two years, and attend monthly PEER Review. Family Advocates have 24 hours of initial training and 8 hours of continuing education every two years.

Medical evaluators include Physician Assistants, and Advanced Practice Nurses who acquire 40 hours initial training, 16 hours of didactic training, and 8 hours of

continuing education every two years. Mental health providers are either licensed or working toward licensure and have completed 40 contact hours in trauma-informed evidence-supported mental health treatment with continuing education of 8 hours every two years and ongoing clinical supervision.

2) Cultural competency and diversity training is a significant part of everyday practice at RCC. Staff are required to participate in Diversity, Equity and Access training at a minimum of 8 hours every two years and MDT members are offered this training annually.

In January, 2021, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors approved a 5-year strategic plan, which included the development of a Racial Equity and Social Justice pillar. The RCC Coordinator is a member of the Core Equity Team, has completed advanced training, and is part of Core Equity's Steering Committee. This topic will continue to be at the forefront of our work and training opportunities shared with MDT members.

RCC offers forensic interviews in both English and Spanish, which are the primary languages spoken by the majority of clients, and has two designated bilingual Spanish-speaking forensic interviewers. Court-certified professional translators assist MDT members needing translation. Translation services for other languages and American Sign Language are available as needed.

3) RCC provides a child-focused setting that is designed to offer a safe, comfortable, and neutral environment where forensic interviews and other services can be accessed expeditiously. Alleged offenders are not allowed at RCC. Clients and families are observed and supervised within sight or hearing distance by RCC staff or MDT members. RCC is convenient and accessible to clients and MDT members and complies with all guidelines stipulated in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and/or state legislation. Areas where children may be present, as well as age and culturally appropriate toys and other resources are child-proofed, cleaned, and sanitized to be as safe as possible. Client service areas are designed and decorated to alleviate anxiety and instill confidence and comfort. Interview rooms help a child feel comfortable, safe, and free from distractions. A dedicated forensic interview specialist speaks with the child while MDT members observe and listen to the interview behind a oneway mirror. This allows for the child's comfort while enabling investigators to contribute questions or clarify information via an earpiece in the interviewer's ear. This interview minimizes further trauma to the child. Interviews are recorded and used during the investigation as an aid in criminal charging, and are made available to the Court. The recorded interview is then available to use in support of the child's testimony in the courtroom setting.

4) The direct victim services offered on site at RCC are family advocacy, forensic interviews, medical exams, and mental health crisis intervention. Advocates provide crisis assessment and intervention, safety planning, risk assessment, and support for children and family members during all stages of involvement with the CAC. They further assess for the client's basic needs and cultural considerations and ensure those needs are addressed within the MDT. Family Advocates meet with clients when they arrive and remain with them during the forensic interview. There is a constant sharing of information with the MDT to keep team members informed and support the family. Clients receive information about victim's rights and compensation. Additional assistance with tangible services also includes housing, food, transportation, clothing, hotel vouchers, and legal and financial assistance. The support from family advocates goes far beyond the visit to RCC and extends through the life of the case.

Evidence-based mental health services are offered to children and families offsite through a linkage agreement. If immediate intervention is needed, RCC's mental health clinicians will respond to the center and support the child and family. When children and families are seen for therapeutic services, evidencebased assessments are administered at the beginning, middle, and end of treatment. Clinicians offer several different evidence-based treatment modalities

in both English and Spanish. Direct victim services funded through this subaward include Family Advocacy, Forensic Interviews, and Mental Health services.

5) RCC refers child abuse survivors to a variety of non-profit partners for direct services. These agencies provide sexual assault advocacy, supportive services and counseling for Native families, intimate partner violence resources, trauma-informed evidence-supported mental health services, and family advocacy assisting families with victim compensation benefits. RCC has the added benefit of being housed within The Family Justice Center (FJC) which includes access to housing, financial and job resources, legal assistance, summer camp programs for children, and holistic healing practices such as trauma focused yoga and massage.

6) RCC has written protocols for case review procedures and case tracking. The purpose of the policy is to guide the process of reviewing client cases that have utilized services at RCC. It is RCC's policy to conduct monthly follow-up case reviews in order to evaluate the MDT's coordinated response, case status, and services needed by the child and family. The written protocol includes the frequency of meetings, designated attendees, case selection criteria, process for adding cases to the agenda and designating a facilitator, mechanisms for

distribution of the agenda, notification of the case to be discussed, procedures for follow-up recommendations to be addressed, and the meeting location.

In addition to case review, daily or weekly briefings are conducted with on-site staff to review immediate scheduling and/or case issues.

RCC uses a case management database to track case demographics, abuse type, relationship to offender, MDT involvement and outcomes, and status follow through of medical and mental health referrals. Charges filed and case dispositions are shared with RCC monthly by the District Attorney's (DA's) Office. Child Protection outcomes are tracked through the Child Welfare Case Management System (CWS/CMS).

c. Capabilities

1) Since 1994, RCC has worked with MDT partners to provide over 7,700 forensic interviews and 1,297 forensic sexual assault medical exams to children involved in child abuse investigations. RCC has an Operational Agreement signed by authorized representatives at each core agency committing all parties to a multidisciplinary child abuse response. These agencies include Sonoma County DA's Office; Sonoma County LE Chief's Association (all Sonoma County LE agencies); Sonoma County Human Services Department; Sonoma County

Department of Health Services (Public Health and Behavioral Health); LifeWorks and YWCA (Mental Health Services); and Verity (Family Advocate).

- 2) Agencies providing direct services provide documentation of essential training in accordance with the NCA Accreditation Standards. Mental health clinicians are trained in trauma-informed evidence-supported modalities and use evidence-based assessment tools to guide and inform the therapeutic process. Advocates deliver an evidenced-based screening tool to all children. Ongoing training opportunities are available to team members for their continued development. MOUs are signed by partner agencies that outline expectations for service delivery and training.
- 3) RCC has provided victim-centered, trauma-informed forensic interviews, advocacy, therapy referrals, and sexual assault medical exams since August 16, 1994, maintaining full NCA accreditation since 1998. Mental health referrals are offered to families through linkage agreements and sexual assault forensic medical exams are conducted on site by on-call medical providers 24 hours a day.
- 4) Proposed staff include a full-time FA and a 0.5 FTE FI. The FA will be employed by Verity, a non-profit serving sexual assault victims locally since 1974, and will be supervised jointly by the RCC Coordinator and Verity Clinical Supervisor. The RCC

Coordinator has over 25 years' experience in CW, with over 5 years leading RCC. The FI position will be divided between two trained FIs, each with a minimum of 2 years' experience in the position and both with Master's Degrees in Social Work. They will be supervised by the RCC Coordinator. RCC's contracted therapy providers are LifeWorks and the YWCA. Since 1996, LifeWorks has earned a reputation for providing mental health services that are informed, respectful, and culturally responsive. Since 1975, The YWCA has been the County's main provider of domestic violence intervention, treatment, and prevention services.
