

AB 481 Military Equipment Use Policy

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AB 481 Overview

September 30, 2021:

AB 481 was signed into law as Government Code sections 7070 – 7075

Legislative Intent:

 To increase public transparency by which all California law enforcement agencies fund, acquire, and/or use military equipment, as defined by AB 481.

Law Enforcement Agency Requirements:

- Present to the Board of Supervisors a Military Equipment Use policy.
- Provide an annual report to the Board of Supervisors and the public after first year of adoption.
- Hold at least one, well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting prior to annual report.

Board of Supervisor Requirements:

Approve a "Military Equipment" policy through the adoption of an ordinance.



AB 481 Overview (Cont.)

Board of Supervisor Role:

- Approve a "Military Equipment" policy through the adoption of an ordinance.
- Per AB 481 (7071(d)), this approval will be granted if the Board determines the following:
 - The military equipment is necessary because there is not reasonable alterative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
 - The proposed military equipment use policy will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties.
 - If purchasing the equipment, the equipment is reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
 - Prior military equipment use complied with the military equipment policy that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying military equipment use policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance.



Military Equipment as defined by AB 481


- (1) Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles
- (2) Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers
- (3) High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMWV)
- (4) Tracked armored vehicles
- (5) Command and control vehicles
- (6) Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind
- (7) Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature
- (8) Firearms of .50 caliber or greater
- (9) Ammunition of .50 caliber or greater
- (10) Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber (with the exception of standard issue service weapons)
- (11) Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles
- (12) "Flashbang" grenades and explosive breaching tools, "tear gas," and "pepper balls"
- (13) Taser Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and the Long Range Acoustic Device (LRAD)
- (14) 40mm projectile launchers, "bean bag," rubber bullet, and specialty impact munition (SIM) weapons
- (15) Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight
- (16) Exempts equipment that is not controlled or prohibited by the Federal Defense Logistics Agency

 - Conduct community engagement regarding the use of "military equipment" prior to the annual report
 - Maintain a place on the website for people to ask questions, express concerns, or file complaints related to this policy.
