2) Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify

#### A. How the line items support the objectives and activities

The budget includes \$123,027 in Personnel expenses. Personnel expenses include \$69,335 in salary and \$42,559 in benefits for a 1.0 FTE Homeless Outreach Coordinator (Administrative Aide) who will provide direct services to assist homeless victims of crime find shelter and services, build strong inter-agency collaboration, strengthen data collection, provide systems analysis that can refine service strategies, build community awareness, and identify new resources to provide to clients. Also included will be \$6,344 in salary and \$4,789 for 0.0625 of the Victim Services Director who provides oversite to the Homeless Outreach Coordinator and team, approves all housing requests, and collaborates with partner agencies.

The County of Sonoma benefit package includes Retirement, FICA / Medicare, Health Insurance, Disability Insurance, Dental Insurance, Life Insurance, Vision Insurance, Unemployment Insurance, and Workers' Compensation Insurance.

The budget also includes \$125,715 in Operating Expenses associated with implementing the proposed plan. Operating expenses include three Second-Tier Subawards: 1) \$20,000 for Catholic Charities to provide 0.40 FTE (two days/week) of an Outreach Worker to victims of crime who are homeless; 2) \$54,000 to Verity for a 1.0 FTE Outreach Worker to assist victims of crime who are homeless; and 3)

\$13,000 to The Living Room who will a) provide the services of 0.15 Housing Case Manager who works at their Life Center, a hub for services that allows individuals to be connected to local partners, food, and transitional housing programs, and b) provide gap housing for stays from one night up to six weeks, covering costs of a weekly panty food bag, utilities, supplies, and cleaning upon exiting.

The remaining operating costs include client services for emergency housing and supplies, outreach, a cell phone allowance for Verity's full-time Outreach Worker, and the Coordinator travel to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NCADV) training.

#### B. How funds minimize administrative costs and support direct services

Allocations requested will be used to fund direct services as the priority for the program. The grant award will be dedicated to employee salaries, benefits, and operating expenses to include services of participating staff who are not employed by this applicant. No indirect costs are requested. The project budget supports two contracted Outreach Workers to provide outreach and link crime victims to services. Outreach includes visits to sites where homeless individuals congregate to identify and serve homeless victims of crime that may have disabling conditions. The contracted Housing Case Manager will provide assistance to homeless victims of crime with housing navigation, assistance

completing applications, and job-seeking support. A full-time Homeless

Outreach Coordinator provides support for the Outreach Workers as well as supporting the broader Victim Services Steering Committee (VSSC) initiative, including data collection.

#### C. How shared costs are allocated.

The budget does not include shared costs.

#### D. How staff duties and time support the objectives and activities.

All grant-funded staff duties and time commitments directly support the proposed objectives and activities of the VSSC plan. The 1.0 FTE Homeless Outreach Coordinator is fully dedicated to this grant, providing direct services to victims/survivors who are homeless, including accessing shelter or housing, coordinating outreach and education efforts, and continuing to build relationships with other service providers. Second-tier subaward funded positions will also support proposed objectives and activities: the Catholic Charities 0.4 FTE Outreach Worker, who spends her remaining time working for the Homeless Outreach Street Team, a local multidisciplinary group, the fulltime Verity Outreach worker, and the 0.15 FTE Housing Case Manager.

Sonoma County, located on the northern coast of California, comprises nearly 16,000 square miles of land and water. Sonoma County ranges from very small coastal rural communities to the increasingly urban City of Santa Rosa where the majority of the population resides and works. Despite the attractive quality of life, the shift from a somewhat rural community to an urban community has presented challenges in addressing crime trends in this County. Today the population is estimated to be over 500,000 Sonoma County residents. The majority of new residents, 69%, live within the boundaries of Sonoma County's nine cities. The City of Santa Rosa is the county seat and has led this growth in total population, adding 15,841 residents, over ten years to attain its current population of 176,938 people.

A trend we see in 2022 is the increase in the Hispanic population in Sonoma County. More than one in five residents are Hispanic/Latino as seasonal work in the vineyards and ranches attract migrant workers. Wildfires in 2017, 2019 and 2020, plus two years of insecurity caused by COVID-19 pandemic, has adversely affected affordable housing, decreased tax revenues, and led to more families and single incomes struggling to be able to afford necessities.

According to Redwood Empire Food bank, one in six Sonoma County residents is facing food insecurity. Individuals are often faced with a challenging choice



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between food or gas to get to work, food or medicine to stay healthy, and food or childcare. Additionally, COVID-19 has caused a significant increase in health issues, unemployment, and people experiencing homelessness. The unemployment rate in the Sonoma County in September 2022 was 2.6%, down from a revised 5.70% from last year. Almost 50% of Sonoma County's employed population is in the category of Services, which includes education, health care, tourism, and legal services. The second largest sector is Retail Trade, followed by Manufacturing. This demonstrates a strong, high demand for tangible goods in the Sonoma County area.

Victim Services has been part of the District Attorney's Office since 2002 and is based at the Sonoma County Hall of Justice (HOJ). The Homeless Outreach Team formed in 2016 with funding from the original XC grant and is housed at the Family Justice Center Sonoma County (FJCSC), which is walking distance from the HOJ. The Homeless Outreach Team provides direct outreach to homeless victims of crime focusing on those experiencing disabling mental, emotional, and physical conditions. Outreach workers resolve immediate needs for support, engage individuals in a vulnerability assessment, and link victims to ongoing, comprehensive care as well as to prosecution and restitution. The project seeks to coordinate care to homeless victims of crime throughout



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Sonoma County and to broaden community understanding of the scope and nature of crimes against the homeless. This team is comprised of a coordinator from Victim Services and three outreach workers, one each from Verity, Catholic Charities, and a recently added housing coordinator from The Living Room.

Domestic Violence, bullying, and adult physical assault are the most prevalent crimes perpetrated against the victims we serve. Another trend we continued to monitor is an increase in gun violence- related cases, since our community has been greatly impacted by an increase in the number of homicides. Due to challenges in staffing, the former partner agency, YWCA, is not able to provide an outreach worker at this time but is available in the community to provide referrals to domestic violence survivors via their 24-hour hotline. The YWCA supports families affected by domestic violence in Sonoma County by providing safe shelter, therapy, advocacy, and on-going support. Additionally they operate a safe house, and a therapeutic childcare program.

Verity strives to eliminate all forms of violence in Sonoma County, with a special focus on sexual assault and abuse. Verity facilitates healing and promotes the prevention of violence by providing counseling, advocacy, intervention, and education in our community. They have a 24-hour hotline,



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support groups, and receive grant funds to assist victims of human trafficking..

Catholic Charities is the largest homeless service provider in our area and they are known for providing wrap around services to homeless individuals and immigration services. For those who experience homelessness - from the risk of losing stable housing to the stark realities of homelessness- Catholic Charities provides shelter, counseling, and security while working together to build long-term housing solutions. Catholic Charities will be joined by a new offsite partner, The Living Room

The Living Room, provides services to homeless women and children who are experiencing homelessness or may be at risk of becomig homeless. A provider of services in our community for the past 29 years, The Living Room continues to expand its services and just last year opened their Life Center, a hub for services during regular business hours that allows individuals to be connected to local partners, food, and transitional housing programs. The Living Room seeks to increase services where gaps have been identified. A goal of the new partnership is to provide gap housing to victims of crime. Afterthe immediate shelter situation has been met via hotel stays, female victims will be connected to the services through The Living Room. The goal will be to reduce



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the possibility of female victims feeling like they have no viable options after the initial crisis situation.

The new partnership with The Living Room would allow our victims to benefit from Gap Housing, it would infer that there is a set exit date from The Living Room's housing options which would happen when the victim would be able to get into a longer term or permanent housing situation. While in their program which could last one night or up to six weeks, it would allow victims to catch a respite, focus on their job, provide immediate housing support and food. The grant funds would not only help support a housing advocate who would provide case management (care coordination) and would also help cover a portion of the victim's housing fees such as utilities and weekly pantry bag.

The Coordinator leads the team providing support and organization. The Coordinator enters clients into the Coordinated Entry system for additional housing resources, maintains data collection, and works closely with the District Attorney Advocates to refer clients for VCB applications and advocacy with the criminal justice system.



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The population we serve, namely Sonoma County families and individuals who are victims of crime experiencing homelessness, have also endured collective, community trauma due to the pandemic and fires. The impact on them has been both acute and compounded since many are unsheltered and unable to socially distance in tents. A few local encampments reported a few outbreaks of syphilis and scabies, causing for a larger stigma towards how the community views individuals that identify as homeless. The County's resources overall were down during shelter in place and many teams were unable to do outreach in the field. Additionally, COVID protocol cut shelter bed capacity in half which severely limited the options for those experiencing homelessness to escape inclement weather and have a bed to sleep in for over a year. At least twice during this past year, multiple shelter facilities were unable to accept new participant intakes due to COVID outbreaks in their client population. The Homeless Outreach team has had to adjust to the ever-changing dynamics of COVID-19 with some of our partner agencies taking additional safety precautions while meeting clients in the field. For clients with transportation issues, this led to a gap or barrier. Due to services being remote or "virtual," clients continue to feel disconnected since some are unable to see the advocate to whom they are speaking and unable to come to a safe nurturing



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place like the Family Justice Center. The virtual world unfortunately created unprecedented challenges when working with such a vulnerable population, making it more of a courageous journey to have to disclose at times sensitive life circumstances. These additional stressors exacerbate mental health issues and have led to increased anxiety and depression; along with an increase in individuals not following through with services. As a result of FJC being closed to the public, the Homeless Outreach Team found an opportunity to partner with The Living Room's Day Center, where advocates meet with clients in person at least once a week.

Individuals and families served by the XC grant continues to grow due to increased outreach, an increase in need due to the pandemic and fires and returning clients. This project has been very successful at a time when homelessness exploded in Sonoma County. As homelessness and certain crimes such as domestic violence and hate crimes have been on the rise, many community partners have turned to the Homeless Outreach Team as a critical asset in assisting these individuals.



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#### **PLAN**

The anticipated impact of this funding will focus on salary and benefits to the four staff members working under this grant. Additional funds will go towards mileage, short-term motel stays, gap housing, and office supplies. This will allow the team to continue efforts that have already been established in the community and address gaps and needs.

The Office of the District Attorney's Victim Services Division will administer the XC Grant Subaward and act as the single point of contact for the grant. A process has been established between the Victim Services Director, grant analyst, and the accounting department to approve and pay invoices monthly to the three partners. The distribution of funds is outlined in the contract and MOU for clarity and agreement.

Part of the plan is to continue to expand the use of the Family Justice

Center of Sonoma County and its collaborative partners to comprehensively
serve victims of violence. The FJCSC, through partnerships with government and
community agencies, provides wraparound services to victims of domestic
violence, sexual assault, child abuse, elder abuse, stalking, and human
trafficking. All partners work together as a team to provide services to victims in



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a trauma-informed approach to reduce the number of times a victim must repeat their story.

In addition to the Homeless Outreach Team, onsite community partners include the YWCA (Navigators), Verity (Advocates serving sexual assault victims), Legal Aid (Attorneys aiding with domestic violence civil restraining orders), Council on Aging (Advocate serving elder victims), Inter-Tribal Council (Advocate serving Native American victims) and Catholic Charities (Specialist assisting victims in U-Visa and VAWA applications). All the above-mentioned FJC partners also participated in a research initiative for polyvictimization which included completing an assessment for individuals who have been the victim of multiple different crimes. Given that many individuals experiencing homelessness have been the victim of multiple crimes, as highlighted in XC data, it has been a valuable tool to use with clients helping understand the different symptoms they may experience, and the trauma which is tied to them. The tool serves as an additional assessment to help with service referrals and an overall needs assessment.

Coming out of stricter COVID-19 policies, the Coordinator has been able to expand partnerships and community outreach opportunities. Presentations



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on the XC Grant program have been requested by other nonprofit agencies, medical agencies, as well as community groups such as the Kiwanis Club. These outreach opportunities have expanded partnerships with West County Community Services and West County Health Center to better serve more rural areas of the county that previously were not as well connected. In addition, a partnership with nonprofit organizations such as Ruthless Kindness, a mobile free vet clinic to provide care for the pets of victims of domestic violence, developed during the 2021 grant cycle and provides opportunity for referral for services as well as outreach opportunities to reach more individuals at their clinics which serve similar targeted populations.

Government partners include two law enforcement agencies, Santa Rosa Police Department's and the Sheriff's Domestic Violence Sexual Assault units. The Human Services Department staffs the Redwood Children's Center (RCC), with support from Child Protective Services (CPS), and Adult Protective Services (APS); Sonoma County Department of Health Services provides mental health services. Additional District Attorney staff, including Deputy District Attorneys and DA Investigators who focus on child abuse and elder abuse, and a specially assigned prosecutor for a Violence Against Women Act grant, are housed at FJCSC to provide a collaborative, trauma-informed approach to



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serving victims. The majority of our staff are bilingual, bicultural Spanish speaking in order to meet the needs of the community. There is also a Deaf Hope computer station for use with deaf victims, and advocates are trained in the use of the TTY system as needed. The County is contracted with a number of interpretation agencies to provide immediate assistance in ASL and other languages. By making all services at the FJCSC available to clients who are located through the work made possible by the XC grant, we are able to meet a greater variety of needs to overcome obstacles in recovery.

Continued identification of gaps include lack of transportation, limited housing resources, and barriers created by the COVID-19 pandemic. Former identified gaps in transportation plan to be addressed by increasing transportation gift cards to include Uber, County and City of Santa Rosa buses, and gas vouchers. As a result of cost savings in the 2021 grant cycle, were able to purchase Lyft cards to make them available to our homeless victims of crime. The goal has been to setup a concierge LYFT account to be able to schedule rides for victims to be able to get them to work interviews, to service providers or to safe shelter. Another need that the Committee has agreed to support is additional hotel nights for a particular victim when local shelter providers are not able to complete intakes due to possible COVID-19 outbreaks or exposures.



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Shelters have become more restrictive, reducing numbers to maintain social distancing to stop the spread of COVID-19 when outbreaks or peak waves hit the community. Offering clients alternative options like safe parking, short-term motel stays, and referrals to other housing placements is essential. The Coordinator stays current on housing availability through meetings and collaboration with offsite partners. During the 2021 grant cycle, the Coordinator established membership on the local Continuum of Care Strategic Planning Committee as the represented Victim Services Organization so that homeless victims of crimes will be prioritized for the county's homeless service plans.

As a result of COVID-19, our office has not been able to work or recruit volunteers to assist in our efforts. We have however, tried to continue growing partnerships during these uncertain times. More recently we have reconnected with the two colleges in our jurisdiction, Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) and Sonoma State University (SSU). A continued goal is to further develop relationships with the colleges to promote volunteer or internship possibilities. Currently, we plan ongoing collaboration with these colleges for outreach and educational events. Upon selection, volunteers and interns must pass a background check, receive training, and are partnered with advocates to obtain a wide variety of experience.



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Ongoing objectives and activities for the grant include:

- Continue to contact new crime victims to provide advocacy, resources,
   and housing
- Increase Coordinated Entry enrollment by five percent
- Increase follow-up to clients through case management and continue to track data and trends for services provided
- Continue to expand the use of the Family Justice Center of Sonoma
   County and its collaborating partners to better serve victims of crime who face homelessness
- Continue to provide community outreach and education presentations focused on reaching underserved victim populations
- Enhance emergency assistance by providing clothing, toiletries, and first aid supplies
- Purchase and distribute fuel, bus, and ride share gift cards for transportation needs
- Partner with the food bank to supply food to clients
- Offer short-term motel stay as needed for clients
- Increase outreach efforts to Transitional Aged Youth (TAY) by five percent
- Increase referrals from health care providers by offering trainings



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The Victim Services Division collaborates with other county departments, law enforcement, and community agencies. Victim Services Operational Agreements are currently in the process of being renewed. We have excellent working relationships with these agencies providing training and collaborating on numerous outreach events. The Victim Services Director and staff are part of many multi-disciplinary Teams including the Family Violence Prevention Council, Human Trafficking Task Force, Redwood Children Center Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) meeting, Elder Abuse MDT meeting, Elder Protection Workgroup, and the Domestic Violence Death Review.

Extensive training is offered to and attended by the Homeless Outreach

Team, which includes the following trainings in the last fiscal year: Unconscious

Bias, Mitigating Unconscious Bias, COVID-19 & Hope, Working with Victim with

Disabilities, Pathways to Housing. Unfortunately, due COVID-19 staff has not

been able to participate in community outreach events.


