Mission

The mission of the Child Care Planning Council of Sonoma County is to convene and inspire the community through collaboration, leadership and advocacy to promote and plan for quality child care and development for the benefit of all children (birth to 12), their families and Sonoma County.

Purpose of Needs Assessment

The Child Care Planning Council of Sonoma County (CCPC) is responsible for providing a forum to identify the child care priorities of families in Sonoma County and to develop policies to meet those needs. To accomplish this, the CCPC is responsible for a number of tasks, one of which is to conduct a county-wide assessment of child care needs, called the "Needs Assessment," at least once every five years. The term "child care" includes a range of early care and education settings, including half-day and full-day preschools, licensed family child care homes, after-school programs, etc. The Needs Assessment shall meet the requirements as specified in Education Code, Section 8499.5(b). This study represents the Needs Assessment in Sonoma County for 2019, and it is an update from the 2014 study. A Data Committee, composed of Council staff and members, was assigned by the CCPC to oversee this study preparation. This committee has provided tremendous input and oversight into the preparation of this study, the data collection, and analysis process. The information in this study is used to:

- Identify gaps and opportunities
- Guide strategies and investments
- Inform the development of the 2015-2020 comprehensive county-wide Child Care Plan

Approach and Methodology

This 2019 study presents an update of the 2014 Sonoma County Needs Assessment at the county level only. The update incorporates the template developed by the Child Care Coordinators Association (CCCCA) to assist local planning councils in preparing needs assessments. The template suggested by the association is provided in **Attachment A**. The underlying data and a summary description of that data including sources are provided in **Attachment B**. This report uses data and information that is readily available from various public agencies (as provided) and on the internet. No primary data was collected for this effort, such as surveys. Data presented is generally "point in time" data for the most current year or time frame available, which ranges from 2016 to 2019.

Since this report uses data and information that is readily available from various public agencies (as provided) and on the internet, we are aware that the many undocumented children in the

County are not included. Therefore, please note that population and child care demand data in this report may be significantly underestimated.


Key Findings

1. From 2014 to 2019, the population of children ages 0 to 12 in Sonoma County decreased by 9.2% from approximately 74,200 to 67,400 (see Table 1).

There are currently 67,374 children ages 0 to 12 which make up 13.2% of the total population of Sonoma County. This is 6,798 less children ages 0 to 12 than were in the County in 2014 at the time of the last Child Care Needs Assessment. Total population in Sonoma County has increased during the same time period, at the rate of 3.7%.

2. There is currently a shortage of almost 4,700 child care spaces across all age groups in the County, with the largest shortage, of 2,900 spaces, being for school age children (see Table 15).

Overall, the County is meeting 82% of the demand for child care for children ages 0 to 12. There is demand for almost 25,492 spaces and there are 20,937 available. For the County as a whole, there is a shortage of 4,655 spaces across all ages, 0 to 12 years. There are significant shortages for infant and school age care; for preschool spaces 94% of demand is being met.



3. The greatest shortage in care is for school age children, ages 5 to 12 years. Currently there is a shortage of approximately 2,900 spaces (see Table 15).

For school age children, ages 5 to 12, 80% of total demand is currently met. There is a need for 14,638 spaces and only 11,752 are available in the County. This leaves a shortage of 2,886 school age spaces. While there are additional license-exempt programs for school age kids, they are not counted in the supply data because they have not chosen to be listed in the county's Resource and Referral agencies' data bases. Also, license-exempt programs may not meet families' needs for full-year care.

4. The greatest percentage shortfall is for infant care spaces, with only 51% of demand being met (see Table 15).


Infant care includes children ages 0 to 23 months. There is currently a shortage of 1,218 infant spaces in Sonoma County. Overall, there is a demand for 2,461 infant spaces and there are 1,243 spaces available.

5. For preschool children, ages 3 and 4, there is a shortage of approximately 551 child care spaces with 94% of total demand being met (see Table 15).

There is a demand for 8,493 preschool spaces. Currently there are only 7,942 available in the County, with a shortfall of 551.

6. There is a significant shortage of subsidized care for children in the County, with only 45% of the demand met for children 0 to 12 (see Tables 11 and 15).

There are approximately 21,500 children ages 0 to 12 in Sonoma County who live in households that earn equal to or less than 85% of the State Median Income (SMI) and qualify for subsidized child care. Almost 3,100 infants qualify for subsidized child care but only 445 spaces are available and only 14% of demand is met. For preschool age children, 65% of demand for subsidized care is currently met, with a shortage of 1,700 slots. For school age children, 45% of demand for subsidized care is met, with a shortage of about 7,600 spaces. Currently, only 45% of overall demand for subsidized care is being met, as compared to 2014, when only 16% of demand for subsidized care was met.



7. About 10% of children under the age of 6 and 11% of children ages 6 to 12 in Sonoma County live below the Federal Poverty Level (see Table 7).

Almost 7,000 children in Sonoma County live in families that earn less than the Federal Poverty Level, which is \$25,750 for a household of four in 2019. Additionally, 46.5% of infants, 47.4% of preschoolers, and 46.8% of school age children live in families earning less than 85% of SMI, or \$67,169 (for 2017). That is a total of 31,609 children ages 0 to 12 in families earning less than 85% SMI (or 46.9% of all children). Another resource for understanding family incomes in Sonoma County is the California Family Needs Calculator (formerly the Self-Sufficiency Standard Tool). According to the report, 44% of households with one or more children live below the Standard, as compared to 20% for households with no children.¹

8. The number of children ages 0 to 12 years old speaking languages other than English and the ethnic range of Sonoma County has increased since 2014 and is expected to continue to increase (see Tables 2 and 3).

In 2014, 65% of children ages 0 to 12 years old spoke English as their primary language. Now, in 2019, this percentage is 62%. Of the multilingual 38%, most, or 34% are Spanish speaking. Other languages include Vietnamese, Filipino, Khmer, Mandarin and Farsi. Hispanic children make up 45.5% of the child population and White children make up 42.6%. Multiracial is the next largest group with 4.3%.

Summary of Children and Child Care Data as of 2019

The following is a summary snapshot of the data from Attachment B.

- ◆ Total Children 0 to 12: 67,375 or 13.2% of total population in 2019.
 - o 10,138 children under 2 years old or 15% of total 0 to 12 children.
 - o 15,232 children 2 to 4 years old or 22.6% of total 0 to 12 children.
 - o 42,004 children 5 to 12 years old or 62.3% of total 0 to 12 children.

- ◆ CalWORKs: 1,008 children ages 0 to 12 receive public assistance (cash grants) through CalWORKs, countywide.
 - 1,008 children 0 to 12 years old receive CalWORKs or 1.5% of all children 0 to 12, countywide.
- ♦ **Child Protective Services:** 460 children are active with Child Protective Services (March 2019), or about 0.7% of total children countywide.

Attachment B: Detailed Data and Documentation

In preparing the 2019 Child Care Needs Assessment for Sonoma County for the Child Care Planning Council of Sonoma County (CCPC), Nilsson Consulting followed the *LPC Child Care Needs Assessment: Instruction Guide for Completing the Aggregate County Report* as closely as possible. We used the suggested data sources, and additional sources of information as needed. In the following pages, the table numbers correlate to the section numbers in the LPC Child Care Needs Assessment report form generated by the California Child Care Coordinators Association (CCCCA), and the narrative documents how the numbers in the Needs Assessment report were derived.

Children by Age and Total Population

Table 1 shows the number of children, ages 0 to 12 in Sonoma County and total population as of 2019. This data is based on the California Department of Finance P-2 Report, entitled "County Total Population by Age, 2010 to 2060." The data is estimated for 2019 and was last updated on January 31, 2018, which is the most current available data. The Needs Assessment Instruction Guide recommends using the Summary File 1 from the Department of Finance; however it was decided to use the more current P-2 report for the purposes of this Needs Assessment. Totals for each age group—Infants (0 to 2 years), Preschool (3 to 5 years), and School Age (6 to 12 years) are listed at the bottom of the table. **Table 1** also shows the percentage of each age as compared to children ages 0 to 12 years, and to the population as a whole. By group, infants make up 15% of children ages 0 to 12 and 2% of the County's population, preschoolers comprise 22.6% of children ages 0 to 12 and 3.0% of the County's population, and school age children make up 62.3% of children ages 0 to 12 years and 8.2% of the County's population. Since 2014, when the last Needs Assessment for Sonoma County was completed, the number of children ages 0 to 12 years old has decreased from approximately 74,200 to 67,400 or by 9.2%, while overall population increased by 3.7%.

¹ Note that 25% of 5 year olds are included in the 6 to 12 year old, or school age, category in order to account for those children enrolled in Transitional Kindergarten programs.

Ethnicity of Children

Table 2 shows the breakdown of race/ethnicity for the population ages 0 to 12 years old as of 2017-18, which is the latest data available for ethnicity. Children who are Hispanic/Latino make up 45.5% of the 0 to 12 population in Sonoma County, followed by White children at 42.6% of the 0 to 12 population children, and Multiracial at 4.3%. Data in **Table 2** is based on the California Department of Finance's Summary 1 file.

Language Spoken by Children in Grades K to 12

Child Population by Language reflects the primary language spoken (other than English) by children in grades K to 12 in Sonoma County as of 2017-18, and which is summarized in **Table 3**. Data on language spoken is from the California Department of Education's Data Quest database (www.cde.ca.gov). This data set is not available for children ages 0 to 5 years old, but it is assumed that the K to 12 data is reflective of the language spoken by households with younger children in the County. Spanish makes up the greatest percentage (93.3%) of primary language spoken (not including English), followed by Vietnamese (0.93%), and Mandarin (0.48%). When looking at all children in K to 12 grades, Spanish speakers make up 34.1% of the population. No other language is greater than 1% of total children. Overall, 38.1% of children speak a language other than English.

Children with Special Needs

The number of children with an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP) or Individualized Education Plan (IEP) is broken down by age group in **Table 4**. IFSPs are for families with children younger than 3 years and IEPs are for children ages 3 and up. Data regarding children with special needs comes from Sonoma County SELPA, the North Bay Regional Center, and the California Department of Education. There are 135 infants with IFSPs, 1,000 preschoolers, and 5,226 school-age children with IEPs, for a total of 6,361 children 0 to 12. Numbers of children with special needs typically increase as children get older, primarily due to higher rates of identification and diagnosis.

Children in Child Protective Services

Table 5 provides information on the number of children in Child Protective Services (CPS) as of 2018. Based on data from County of Sonoma Human Services Department, there were 460 children ages 0 to 12 years old in Child Protective Services. During the period from March 2018 to March 2019, 201 children ages 0 to 12 were referred by Child Protective Services to child care services. Not all children referred by Children Protective Services actually enter the child care system.

Children in CalWORKs

The number of children in families on CalWORKs by age group is shown in **Table 6**. The data for CalWORKs Stage 1 is provided by the County of Sonoma Human Services Department for February 2019, and includes 48 infants, 29 toddlers and 47 school-age children. CalWORKs Stage 2 and 3 data was provided by River to Coast Children's Services and the Community Child Care Council of Sonoma County. CalWORKs Stage 2 is supporting child care for 40 infants, 164 preschoolers and 220 school-age children. CalWORKs Stage 3 has 14 infants, 105 preschoolers and 341 school-age kids. There are a total of 1,008 children receiving CalWORKs ages 0 to 12.

Children by Family Income and Age

Table 7 calculates the number of children in families by income category and age group. Based on the American Community Survey 5 Year Estimates (2017), the percentage of families with incomes below the poverty level in the past 12 months for children under 5 years (9.7%) is applied to the total number of infants (under 2 years) and preschoolers (2 to 4 years). The percentage of families with incomes below the poverty level in the past 12 months for children ages 5 to 17 years (10.8%) is applied to school age children (6 to 12 years). These percentages are multiplied by the total number of children in each age group to calculate the number of children in families with incomes below the poverty level.

Using the Early Learning Needs Assessment Tool, created for the CCCCA by the American Institutes for Research (AIR), data on the number of children in each age group with family incomes that are below 85% of State Median Income, (SMI) is calculated. The AIR data shows that 46.5% of children aged under 2, 47.4% of children ages 2 to 4, and 46.8% of children 5 to 12 years old live in families earning less than 85% of SMI. The AIR percentages are based on numbers from the American Community Survey and are calculated separately from the total children they report, which is based on data from the Department of Public Health. According to AIR, these percentage data are more accurate and we are using these factors here.²

Lastly, **Table 7** also calculates the number of children by age group who live in families earning more than 85% SMI. In 2017, the SMI for a family of four in California was \$67,169.³ The Federal poverty guidelines for a family of four in 2019 is \$25,750.⁴

Another resource for understanding family incomes in Sonoma County is the California Family Needs Calculator (formerly the Self-Sufficiency Standard Tool). Assuming a four-person household, with two adults, one preschooler, and one school age child in 2018, the family would require an annual income of \$83,537 to be self-sufficient.⁵ This is significantly more than the Federal poverty guidelines or the SMI for a family of four (2017). According to the report, 44% of households with one or more children live below the Standard, as compared to 20% for households with no children.⁶

Children Eligible for Subsidized Care

Table 9 estimates the number of children by age group whose families work and are eligible for subsidized child care and development. This analysis uses Labor Force Participation Rates from the ACS 5 to Year Survey (2017) for children in households with two working parents and the number of families earning less than 85% of SMI. This data is used to estimate the number of children eligible for subsidized care. It is estimated that 21,542 children ages 0 to 12 qualify for subsidized care in Sonoma County.

Child Care Demand

The child care demand for children in households with working parents is calculated in **Table 10**, as of 2017. The total number of children by age group is multiplied by the Labor Force Participation Rates (65.6% for children under 5 years and 69.7% for children 5 to 12 years) to calculate the number of children with working parents (either two working parents or a single parent who works). The number of children with working parents is then multiplied by the percentage of children who need licensed care by age group (37% for infants, 85% for preschool, and 50% for school age). These percentages are both based on the percentages recommended by the CCCCA and agreed upon by the CCPC. The Needs Assessment instructions suggest 75% for preschool, unless additional information is available to use a more accurate local number. In other studies in similar jurisdictions, 85% has frequently been used to calculate preschool demand because demand for preschool is not only based on need. The benefits of preschool have demonstrated in various studies in recent years and parents are sending their children to preschool for its social benefits, not necessarily because they require child care. The Needs Assessment instructions also recommend 39% demand for school age care, but with more children in Transitional Kindergarten, we have adjusted this to 45% for the purposes of this study. Based on these percentages, it is estimated that 25,592 children ages 0 to 12 years require licensed care in Sonoma County.

Demand for Part-Time Preschool

Table 11 calculates the demand for part-time preschool for children that have at least one non-working parent. The total number of children ages 3 to 4 years is shown, followed by the number of children that have at least one non-working parent. Applying the 47.4% of families below 85% SMI to that figure results in 1,653 children ages 3 and 4 in families earning less than 85% of SMI and with one non-working parent. Because this table calculates children with at least one non-working parent, this is used to consider demand for part-time preschool care instead of full-time care. This figure represents children that may require subsidies for part-time child care. Part-time care is considered important for kindergarten-readiness and all of the benefits of early care and education but does not represent "child care" for all families. It should be noted that some of these parents may wish or need their preschool age child to be in full-time care as well.

Child Care Supply

Licensed capacity at centers and family child care homes is shown in Section 12. **Table 12** presents the number of licensed and license-exempt spaces provided by private child care centers by age. As shown there are a total of 8,777 spaces in 183 licensed child care centers, with 77% as preschool spaces. There are an additional 9.544 spaces in 109 different license-exempt programs, all of which are for school age children. These are the license-exempt spaces that are listed with the local Child Care Resource and Referral (R&R) agencies.

The number of licensed spaces at Family Child Care Homes (FCCH) are also shown in **Table 12**. These numbers are calculated using data the local R&R agencies provided: the number of licensed FCCHs and their desired capacity. The spaces included here are spaces that each FCCH would like to have filled, by age group, and do not necessarily reflect the number of children they are licensed for (some choose to have less children than they are licensed for). In general, small FCCHs can have up to 8 children and large FCCHs can have up to 14. As of March 2019, there are 247 small FCCHs and 85 large FCCHs. For small FCCHs in Sonoma County, there are a total of 564 infant spaces, 696 preschool spaces, and 316 school age spaces for a total of 1,576 spaces at small FCCHs. For large FCCHs, there are a total of 354 infant spaces, 460 preschool spaces, and 226 school age spaces in the County for a total of 1,040 spaces for children at large FCCHs. This provides a total of 2,616 licensed spaces at all Family Child Care Homes in the County.

Cost of Child Care by Type

Table 13 shows the maximum reimbursement rates and average weekly costs of child care for full-time and part-time care at licensed centers and Family Child Care Homes. The maximum reimbursement rates come from the California Department of Education for 2018, the most recent data available, and the average rates for part-time and full-time care at centers and FCCHs comes from the Community Child Care Council of Sonoma County and is current for 2018/19. The average child care preschool space at a center is \$270 per week, for full time care. In FCCHs, the average preschool cost for full time care is \$233 and \$173 is the reimbursement rate for part-time care.

Supply of Subsidized Child Care by Program

The existing capacity serving children who are eligible for subsidized care is shown in **Table 14**. The Community Child Care Council of Sonoma County (4Cs) and River to Coast Children's Services, (April/May 2019) provided numbers for Center-based care, CSPP, FCCHEN, Migrant, Handicap, Alternative Payment, Stage 2 and 3 CalWORKS, Head Start and Early Head Start. Data from the County of Sonoma Human Services Department provided Stage 1 CalWORKS numbers. As of 2019, there were 9,641 children enrolled in some form of subsidized care in the county.

Table 14 also shows the total demand for subsidized spaces that was calculated in **Table 9**. With a total demand of 21,542, about 45% of demand for subsidized spaces is currently met, though this varies by age group; 11,901 children still require, but are unable to find, subsidized care in Sonoma County.

Unmet Need for Child Care by Age

Table 15 determines the shortfall and surplus in child care availability by type and by age group included in the Needs Assessment Form. One data item that is calculated is the unmet need for child care for children, by age group, who require full time care because they have working parents. This is calculated by taking the number of total children with working parents, also shown in **Table 10**, and multiplying this times the percentage of children needing licensed card. These numbers are subtracted from the number of licensed spaces for that age group. Totals show a shortage of 1,218 infant spaces, a shortage of 551 preschool spaces, and a shortage of 2,886 school age spaces.

Table 15 also calculates unmet need for children who need full time care and are eligible for subsidized care. There are 21,542 children who qualify for subsidized care between the ages of 0 to 12 years and 11,901 of those don't receive it. There is also an unmet demand of 403 for part-time preschool spots for enrichment and school readiness and an unmet demand of 1,653 part-time preschool spaces for enrichment and school readiness and eligible for a state subsidy.

Unmet Need for Subsidized Child Care

A detailed assessment of subsidized child care need is shown in **Table 16** below. The shortage for full time care for families of all incomes is also shown in **Table 14** and totals 4,655 spaces for children 0 to 12. The number of children eligible for full time subsidized care is 3,092 infants, 4,736 toddlers and 13,713 school age children. Of these children, 2,647 infants, 1,651 toddlers and 7,602 school agers parents will be unable to find a subsidized space. This leaves a total of almost 12,000 children eligible for subsidized child care, but unable to obtain it.

There are 403 preschool children who have one parent at home, but would still benefit from part time preschool, but are unable to obtain space. There are also 485 preschoolers with one parent at home and who are eligible for subsidized part time care, but whose parents are unable to find a subsidized space for them.
