# **Sonoma Complex Fires**





## **PG&E Litigation**

- ➤ As evidence emerged that PG&E's equipment and infrastructure caused the Fires, Sonoma County entities authorized the initiation of litigation against PG&E
- For the purpose of litigation, department/agency staff and experts collected and analyzed data to assess damages
- Damages assessment resulted in an estimated loss of \$244.3M for all Sonoma entities.

# **PG&E Litigation Timeline**

| Date              | Action/Decision  |  |
|-------------------|--|--|
| January 29, 2018  | Sonoma entities authorized initiation of litigation against Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) to recover damages related to the 2017 Fires.  |  |
| February 26, 2018 | Sonoma entities filed a civil lawsuit in Sonoma County Superior Court to recover damages from PG&E.  |  |
| January 29, 2019  | PG&E filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy, abruptly halting the lawsuit.  |  |
| June 18, 2019     | Sonoma entities and 8 other public entities settled damage claims with PG&E for a combined sum of \$415,000,000. The gross allocated share for the Sonoma entities was \$184,175,480.69. |  |
| June 20, 2020     | Bankruptcy court approved the PG&E reorganization plan. After attorney fees and costs, Sonoma entities received a total of \$149,347,589.50.   |  |



# **Losses and Damages**

| Category of Losses                  | Total    | % of Total |
|-------------------------------------|----------|------------|
| Damages to County/Agency Assets*    | \$111.5M | 45.7%      |
| Future Lost Revenue and Staff Time* | \$86.0M  | 35.2%      |
| Out of Pocket Expenses              | \$26.8M  | 11.0%      |
| Miscellaneous Losses*               | \$20.0M  | 8.2%       |
| Total Damages                       | \$244.3M | 100%       |

### Out of Pocket Expenses (\$26.8M)

Staff time and labor costs to perform work related to fire response and recovery efforts

### Damages to County/Agency Assets (\$111.5M)

- Roads, culverts and trees
- Ecosystem service losses, watershed restoration, water quality protection

Damages to County/Agency Assets (\$111.5M)

### Roads/Culverts and Hazardous Tree Removal

- Fires damaged 32 County roads
- Litigation claim estimate vs. Transportation and Public Works estimate





- To date, \$4M in non-reimbursable expenses to address damage from the fires
- Damage to roads from debris removal from private property originally estimated at \$21.5M, but actual costs closer to \$50M

# Ecosystem Service Losses, Watershed Restoration, Water Quality Protection

- Ag + Open Space
  - Fire damage on 7,317 acres, millions in ecosystem service losses
  - Staff and other costs over \$950,000; \$425,000 still unreimbursed.
- Sonoma Water
  - More than \$4.8M in out-of-pocket damages to stabilize hazardous conditions and protect drinking water, flood protection, wastewater infrastructure



### Future Lost Revenue and Staff Time (\$86M)

- Lost property tax revenue over \$70M
- Non FEMA-reimbursable recovery and mitigation activities

### Miscellaneous (\$20M)

- Unmet needs, including disproportionate impacts to Sonoma County renters
- > Impacts to farmworkers, homeless and precariously housed individuals
- Crisis and mental health counseling



# **Losses and Damages**

- Damages assessment for litigation purposes resulted in an estimated loss of \$244.3M
- Settlement amount \$149.3M represents 61% of the claimed damages
- Settlement does not cover all of the entities' actual damages

- Damages claimed in litigation do not bind the Board to allocate settlement funds to categories of losses
- Settlement funds allocated at the Board's discretion

- Board approved December 2018
- County long-term vision for a resilient future

### Recovery and Resiliency Framework

- 275 proposed actions
- FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Funds (HMGP), CalFIRE
- Many unfunded projects

### Recovery and Resiliency Framework

### **Top 10 Priority Projects**

- Establish a comprehensive Alert and Warning System.
- Work with the community to identify hazards, risks, mitigation strategies, including evacuation routes.
- Facilitate **construction hardening techniques** appropriate for wildfire urban interfaces and **seismic retrofits for rebuilding** and for existing homes through education and grant programs.
- Work with private utility providers on solutions related to hardening infrastructure and on coping with destroyed utilities in a disaster, including undergrounding where appropriate and necessary.



### Recovery and Resiliency Framework

### Top 10 Priority Projects (cont'd.)

- Help property owners navigate vegetation management opportunities through partnership with Fire Safe Sonoma and similar programs.
- Continue to advocate for substantive changes to insurance regulations.
- Engage the Community to raise Awareness about how to prepare and plan ahead for disasters.
- Expedited Permitting for homeowners who are rebuilding.
- ➤ Enhance the 2-1-1 System.
- Develop a One-Stop Shop Resource Center.



Recovery and Resiliency Framework

### Community Preparedness and Infrastructure

- Protocols and partnerships for communicating critical information during a disaster
- Increased vegetation management inspections and expanded chipper capacity
- Primary County technology infrastructure, business systems, and critical facilities needed to support the essential services and critical business operations.








