#### **PG&E Litigation and Settlement**

- Sonoma County entities initiated litigation against PG&E for damages related to the 2017 Fires
- Damages assessment for litigation purposes resulted in an estimated loss of \$244.3M
- Settlement amount of \$149.3M approved in June 2020

Category of Losses	Total	% of Total
Damages to County/Agency Assets	\$111.5M	45.7%
Future Lost Revenue and Staff Time	\$86.0M	35.2%
Out of Pocket Expenses	\$26.8M	11.0%
Miscellaneous Losses	\$20.0M	8.2%
Total Damages	\$244.3M	100%





## **PG&E Settlement Allocation**

- > Board preliminary discussion on August 11, 2020
- Considerations
  - Settlement funds allocated at the Board's discretion
  - Recovery and Resiliency Framework and Top 10 Projects
  - County's Draft Five-year Strategic Plan
  - Impacts to County infrastructure from recent disasters
  - Community Input





#### **PG&E Settlement Funds Allocated**

- Board allocated \$26.8M from PG&E Settlement funds during September budget hearings including:
  - \$2.5M Fire prevention and emergency response
  - **\$9.9M** Fund three years of critical staffing needs
  - \$1.2M Accessing Coordinated Care and Empowering Self Sufficiency (ACCESS)
  - \$8.5M Restore Reserve funds used for 2017 Wildfire response

## **Community Emailed Input**

- 355 emails to <u>PGECommunityInput@sonoma-county.org</u>
  - About 50 community organization/groups (Attachment A)
- Top five categories
  - Road repair (20%)
  - Vegetation management, including forest management, maintenance of County properties, and defensible space around homes (20%)
  - Public safety, including volunteer fire organizations (20%)
  - Housing and/or rental assistance programs (15%)
  - Alert and warning systems and community preparedness (15%)



## **Community Survey**

- 1,600 average # of responses to survey questions
  - Survey links posted to County social media sites
  - Sent to 85 community-based organizations, including Latinx non-profit organizations and immigrant and labor groups
  - Shared with block captain groups
  - 60% of respondents lost homes in 2017 Fires (English), 21% (Spanish)


- Which three areas should the County prioritize as it decides how to allocate PG&E settlement funds?
  - 17 categories listed

# **Damaged Roads**

- 2017 wildfires damaged 32 County roads
- Burned tree removal on private property and public right of way
- Culvert replacement
- > \$4M in non-reimbursable expenses





#### **Recovery and Resiliency Framework**

- Board approved December 2018
- County long-term vision for a resilient future
- Countywide Community Engagement
- > 275 proposed actions
- Grant-funded projects (FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, CalFIRE)
- > Many unfunded projects





### **Recovery and Resiliency Framework**

#### **Top 10 Priority Projects**

- > Establish a comprehensive Alert and Warning System.
- Work with the community to identify hazards, risks, mitigation strategies, including evacuation routes.
- Facilitate construction hardening techniques appropriate for wildfire urban interfaces and seismic retrofits for rebuilding and for existing homes through education and grant programs.
- Work with private utility providers on solutions related to hardening infrastructure and on coping with destroyed utilities in a disaster, including undergrounding where appropriate and necessary.





## **Recovery and Resiliency Framework**

#### Top 10 Priority Projects (cont'd.)

- Help property owners navigate vegetation management opportunities through partnership with Fire Safe Sonoma and similar programs.
- Continue to advocate for substantive changes to insurance regulations.
- Engage the Community to raise Awareness about how to prepare and plan ahead for disasters.
- > **Expedited Permitting** for homeowners who are rebuilding.
- > Enhance the 2-1-1 System.
- > Develop a One-Stop Shop Resource Center.


