



Testing and Positivity






- Testing volume of 369 tests per 100,000 people per day
 - State testing median=315
- Test positivity is 2.5% or lower for all geographies within the county

Vaccine Administration





Equity of Vaccine Distribution






- 22% of doses have been administered in the county's lowest quartile of the Healthy Places Index (neighborhoods with access to fewest socioeconomic and other resources related to health)
- 45% of residents in the lowest quartile are at least partially vaccinated

- Sonoma County has been successful in vaccinating vulnerable residents aged 65+
 - 65-69 age group: 79% at least partially vaccinated
 - 70-74 age group: 87% at least partially vaccinated
 - 75+ age group: 87% at least partially vaccinated

Senior Residential Care Facilities Survey: Key Findings

- Survey of 189 SNF/RCFE facilities (83% response rate)
 - 95% of <u>residents</u> have been fully vaccinated
 - 5% of residents declined due to concerns about side effects, allergic reaction, distrust of vaccines, or being on hospice care
 - 85% of <u>staff</u> have been fully vaccinated, overall
 - Rates varied by facility
 - In half of facilities, 100% of staff were vaccinated
 - In 15% of facilities, over 30% of staff declined vaccination
 - » 1/3 of these facilities had experienced COVID-19 outbreaks previously
 - Top reasons for staff declination included: concerns about safety approval processes, concerns about side effects, reproductive concerns, distrust of vaccines

2021 Vaccine Hesitancy Survey of Staff in Health and Caregiving Settings

• Who are we surveying?

- Using an electronic survey (in Spanish and English) to survey staff in the following fields:
 - In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS)
 - Skilled Nursing Facilities
 - Residential Care Facilities for the Elderly (RCFE)
 - Hospital/Clinics
- Data collection launched in early April and will continue throughout the month

• Why these individuals?

- Health care and caregiving staff have been vaccine eligible the longest and had concrete
 opportunities to make choices around whether or not to get vaccinated
- Their responses will help inform Public Health outreach/messaging and future vaccine hesitancy data collection locally with other residents

Vaccine Eligibility

April 15, 2021:

 Every Californian age 16+ is eligible to receive a vaccine

When you can get vaccinated

California is allocating COVID-19 vaccines as they become available to ensure equitable distribution. Vaccinations are prioritized according to risk and age.

Healthcare workers and long-term care residents (Phase 1A)	Now vaccinating

Janssen Pause

- On April 13, CDC & FDA pause use of Janssen vaccine
- Six cases of cerebral venous sinus thrombosis (CVST) with thrombocytopenia 6-13 days after vaccination
 - Extremely rare (6 cases out of 6.8 million doses)
 - Treatment with heparin dangerous; alternative treatments given
 - Providers asked to report adverse events at: https://vaers.hhs.gov/reportevent.html

Janssen Pause

- Maintain high index of suspicion for symptoms of thromotic events or thrombocytopenia in recently vaccinated patients
 - Severe headache
 - Backache
 - New neurologic symptoms
 - Severe abdominal pain
 - Leg swelling
 - Petechiae, or new or easy bruising

MyTurn Updates

- Age range reduced to two groups: 16-17 and 18+
- Block patients under 18 at clinics using Moderna or Janssen
 - No DOB validation
- Scanning QR Code from Patient's Confirmation email / SMS opens directly to the patient's appointment
- Dashboards for providers/ clinic managers available
- Link to report problems with site added to the bottom of the Home page

MyTurn Updates

- Clinic Manager can send targeted SMS messages to MyTurn Registrants for clinic availability
- Automatically cancel 2nd appointment after 1st appointment cancellation
- Spanish translation for the verbal consent checkbox for Vaccine Administrator
- Allow more pages of results for available clinics
- Bulk upload of users and registrant data

Vaccination and the Unhoused

 Challenge: Unhoused individuals and especially those with co-morbidities are less likely to seek, have access to, and/or accept vaccination but are at higher risk of serious illness from COVID-19

Proposed solutions:

- Regular outreach and education at encampments coordinated with County and community partners
- Identification and support of **COVID peer counselors**
- Mobile vaccination on-site at encampments, in field
- **Incentives**, including gift cards and prevention kits
- Propose procurement of 2,500 gift cards @ \$25 to provide incentives to the unhoused for vaccination and ongoing testing, particularly for those in encampments and on the street but available to all unhoused/unstably housed individuals

Health Equity

- Roseland Library: Tuesday-Saturday operation
- SRJC Roseland Campus clinic: Saturdays & Sundays
- Sonoma Valley working with La Luz for additional clinics 2-3 times a week
- Sutter popup clinic: May 1st
- Planning for a mobile van in the Boyes Hot Springs area potentially starting in May
- Setting up resource tables in collaboration with CURA for all sites.
- Continue prioritizing those living in the <u>lowest HPI</u>
- Continuing to support community lead events
- Building relationships with other populations

Vaccine Communications/Outreach Campaign

- The Health Equity Marketing and Outreach campaign continues with a focus on vaccinations and addressing vaccine hesitancy. These communications include:
 - Streamed Community Briefings on Facebook and YouTube and Public service announcements on Spanish & English radio.
 - Mobile marketing campaign targeting cell-phone users in key
 Census tracts <u>through June 2021</u>
 - Digital and print ads in local newspapers.
 - Public service ads in partnership with CHI COVID Vaccination
 Communications Group, a joint committee involving local
 health care providers and the County.
 - Communications outreach to support existing outreach efforts including vaccination clinics organized in partnership with trusted community-based organizations.
